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| • | Forest Schools was successfully carried out by all classes this year. This has been fundamental in developing the self-esteem, resilience and well-being of children following the ongoing challenges of Lockdowns due to COVID 19 this year. Race for life was extremely well supported by children, staff and families. Over £1000 was raised for Cancer Research and the children benefitted by developing a positive attitude towards exercise in order to maintain a healthy lifestyle. Long term planning had to be adapted due to the restrictions of COVID but the children benefitted from 2 hours of directed PE time weekly when in school and PE was also set during remote learning. Staff CPD continues due to the highly skilled use of a sports coach for all classes weekly. Assessment systems in place. | Re-join Halton School Games and enter more competitions. Improve the provision for dance and opportunities to develop CPD in this area. Continue to develop the amount of time spent physically active by extending 'daily mile' to KS1 and monitoring the amount of time spent teaching PE.
